#### **STEM ACADEMY**

# Which Level Is Right For Me?

#### **ACADEMIC**

Content is geared to "thinkers"

- Learning is theory-based
- Pacing is fairly fast (new concepts presented daily)
- Teaching style is geared to self-motivated and independent learners who are capable of summarizing and applying new concepts
- Workload is demanding (requires daily homework completion)
- A good fit for students with a 70%+ average (Consistently scoring Level 3s and 4s)
- Courses tend to lead to university and college pathways

#### **APPLIED**

- Content is geared to hands-on learners
- Learning is practical and concrete
- Pacing is moderate (new concepts presented every few days)

Teaching style supports small and large group learning

- Workload is moderate (some homework is required)
- A good fit for students with a 60-70% average (Averages Levels 2s and some 3s)
- Courses tend to lead to college and apprenticeship pathways

#### LOCALLY DEVELOPED

- Content is geared to students with gaps in their learning
- Learning is practical and hands-on
- Pacing is matched to the needs of individual learners
- Teaching style supports small and large group learning with enhanced one-on-one support
- Work completion is supported with classroom assistance (homework is minimal)
- A good fit for students with a less than 60% average
- Courses tend to lead to apprenticeship and workplace pathways





# **Grade 9 Course Selection Tips**

When selecting Gr. 9 courses and levels for your child we make the following recommendations:

- A successful Gr. 9 year should be the number one focus when selecting courses and levels.
- High school is 4 years, and just because a student begins at a given level doesn't necessarily mean that they are closing any doors in post-secondary.
   For instance, a Gr. 9 student in Applied English doesn't mean they cannot work towards taking University level English in Gr. 11.
- Your child's Gr. 8 teacher will make recommendations for levels based on their academic performance in class. They know your child's academic performance, and understand the secondary curriculum in Gr. 9. We strongly advise listening to that advice so that your child can meet with success in his/her first year of high school.
- Students do not need to be in all one stream, and can be in different levels
  of courses. Speak to your child's Gr. 8 teacher, and refer to the "Which
  Level Is Right For Me?" sheet for guidance as to what level your child
  should be at in a given course.
- Making level changes or course changes is not always possible, especially
  once the semester or school year starts. Space is sometimes not available in
  a course, or a change isn't possible since it doesn't fit in their schedule. It is
  important that students give careful consideration to their course selection
  each year they are in high school.
- Students are required to complete 30 credits in high school to earn an OSSD. 18 are compulsory and 12 are electives. Most of those compulsories are taken care of in the Gr. 9 & 10 years. Your child's Guidance Counsellor will help to ensure they meet all the requirements prior to graduation.

# What do you need to graduate from high school?

- **0.5** credit in civics

# FAQ @ St. Anne Catholic High School What do I do if...

#### 1. I am absent from school?

If you are absent from school, your parent(s)/guardian(s) **must** phone the 24-hour attendance line (519-727-4497) as soon as possible. If you are unsure whether or not a call will be made prior to your arrival at school then get a note, and bring it to the attendance office **at least 15 minutes before** attending Period 1. If not, a detention, or possibly a suspension, may be issued.

#### 2. I am late for school?

Within the first 15 minutes of Period 1 you will report to class, and the teacher will mark you as late. If you arrive later than 15 minutes, you are to report to the attendance office to receive a late slip. If you are late more than 3 times without a legitimate excuse (ex. sleeping in is not an excuse), you will be given a detention. On your 4<sup>th</sup> late you will receive a **Chronic Late Policy form** that will be mailed home or a Vice Principal will call to notify your parent(s)/guardian(s). Continued lates will lead to more detentions and escalate to suspensions as per the Chronic Late Policy.

#### 3. If I am late because I had a legitimate appointment?

You will report to the attendance office with your note, a previously made phone call by your parent(s)/guardian(s or parent(s)/guardian(s). The only valid reasons for lates are illness, or a dental/medical appointment.

#### 4. I have to leave during the day for a preplanned appointment or event?

You should bring a note from your parent(s)/guardian(s) to the attendance office, or have them call the attendance office before 8:00AM to advise them of the time and reason that you have to leave. You will have to report to the office to receive a **Permit to Leave** slip **before leaving the building**. If you return back to school on the same day, then you must report to the office to get an **Admit to Class** slip from the attendance office. Failure to follow this procedure will result in a detention. **DO NOT LEAVE THE SCHOOL WITHOUT SIGNING OUT THROUGH THE ATTENDANCE OFFICE.** 

# 5. I have to leave school during the day because I am ill, or I have to leave for an appointment that I forgot to have a parent clear?

You should notify your classroom teacher, and ask to go the attendance office. The staff will make all reasonable efforts to contact the people listed as contacts for you in the computer system to get permission for you to leave. Arrangements will be made to have someone pick you up should you be ill. Again, **DO NOT LEAVE THE SCHOOL WITHOUT SIGNING OUT THROUGH THE ATTENDANCE OFFICE.** 

#### 6. I feel too sick to stay in class?

You should report to the attendance office immediately. Do not ask your teacher to go the bathroom, LCC, or cafetorium, and stay there until you feel better. Failure to report to the office immediately will resort in being disciplined.

#### 7. I am absent the day of a schedule test (or exam)?

You must arrange with your parent(s)/guardian(s) to see a doctor to obtain a medical note at your expense. You, with your parent(s)/guardian(s) must present this note within 24 hours of the missed exam to the attendance office. Administration will then arrange for the exam to be written on another available exam day.

#### 9. I am late and missed a test or handing in a major assignment?

You must report to the attendance office to sign in and ask for help in locating your teacher so that you can still hand in the assignment, or make arrangements to write your test. If arrangements can be made, you will write the test prior to going to your next class.

#### 10. I find a course (or courses) too difficult/easy?

You first should talk to your teacher, and then your Guidance Counsellor in Student Services. This conversation may also include the Resource Teacher or the Student Success Teacher. You cannot make any changes to your schedule without first discussing this possibility with your Guidance Counsellor.

#### 11. I have a personal problem that I need to talk about?

You should report to Student Services to speak with your Guidance Counsellor. In the event that no one is available to talk with you, you should report to the attendance office for further assistance.

#### 12. I lose something of value?

You should first tell a teacher who can assist you with giving direction on what your next steps should be. You should first check with the teacher that you were with when you last saw your item. You should also check with the attendance office to see if anyone had turned in the item. You must understand that **the school (staff included) is not responsible** for any lost or misplaced items. Any unclaimed items that have been turned in to the attendance office may be donated to charity at the end of the semester, or school year. **Do not leave anything of value in the Phys. Ed. dressing rooms at any time.** Doors are often locked, but are unlocked when students are getting changed at the beginning and end of class.

#### 13. I lose my lock or student card?

You will have to purchase a new lock from the attendance office. Should you lose your student card, you are to report it to the office, and will have to pay a nominal fee to have another card reprinted.

#### 14. I need to stay after school for something?

You must arrange a ride in order to stay for scheduled activities beyond the school day. Should you require a ride to Tecumseh, you can sign up for the taxi service in the main office prior to 1:00PM. This service drops you off at the Sobey's plaza. If there are not enough students requiring a ride, the taxi service is cancelled for the day.

#### 15. I think I need the elevator to get to class on the second floor?

In the even that you are physically incapable of using the stairs to access the second floor, your parent(s)/guardian(s) must provide a not to the main office explaining what the issue is, and the duration that you will need to use the elevator.

#### 16. I have a phone, or any other electronic device at school?

Electronic devices are permitted at school, and the school is fully wireless. Please note that the school is not responsible for any lost/stolen/damaged electronic devices. All electronic devices are permitted during school hours in the cafetorium, and in class at the teacher's discretion. Students not complying with the responsible use policy or their teacher's instructions will have their device confiscated, and must see administration to have it returned. Please refer to your student agenda for further details.

#### **40 HOURS OF COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT**

The purpose of the 40 hrs of community involvement requirement is to encourage students to develop an awareness and understanding of civic responsibility and the contributions they can make in supporting and strengthening their communities.

Students can begin earning community service hours from the summer between Grade 8 and 9 until their graduation in Grade 12.

#### **KEY ELEMENTS**

Must be completed outside scheduled class time.

Must not be part of a credit course.

Must be unpaid activities.

Must total 40 hours or more.

Must be completed by the end of grade 12 in order to receive a diploma.

#### **ELIGIBLE ACTIVITIES**

The following list of eligible activities are intended to assist the student and parent(s) to determine a planned activity meets the requirements for Community Involvement.

#### **Help Your Community**

- through placement in a structured community-based volunteer organization;
- take part in environmental initiatives;
- get involved in charitable activities;
- coach sports teams;
- undertake a leadership role to help community groups;
- · assist with literacy initiatives;
- participation on committees or advisory boards;
- arts and culture assist at a gallery or performing arts production;
- religious activities;
- assist at a seniors' home/centre.

#### **Help Your Neighbours**

- by providing service to seniors raking, shoveling (no snow blowers), shopping (student should not drive vehicles for this purpose), visiting, reading, meal preparation;
- by providing assistance to an individual, family or a group.



#### **Help Your School**

- school-based community involvement activities are not tied to an academic credit and are open to any student e.g. organizing blood drives; tutor other students;
- assist with planning of arts or athletic events;
- facilitate school events such as parent information nights;
- assist with environmental activities;
- participate in charitable initiatives.

#### **INELIGIBLE ACTIVITIES**

The following activities **MAY NOT** be chosen as community involvement activities. An ineligible activity is an activity that

- is a requirement of a class or course in which the student is enrolled (e.g. cooperative education portion of a course, job shadowing, work experience);
- takes place during the time allotted for the instructional program on a school day. However, an activity that takes place during the student's lunch break or "spare" periods is permissible;
- would normally be or should be performed for wages by a person in the workplace;
- consists of duties normally performed in the home (i.e. daily chores) or personal recreational activities;
- involves activities for a court-ordered program (e.g. communityservice program for young offenders, probationary program);
- any duty performed for an immediate family member.

### What stream should I choose?

Academic courses emphasize theory, problem solving, abstract thinking, and incorporating practical applications. Students considering these courses should be consistently working at a level three or four in Grade 8.

**Applied courses** focus on practical and concrete applications of concepts, and incorporating theoretical applications.

Locally Developed courses emphasize skill acquisition required for success in Grade 11 and 12 Workplace and Open courses and experiential learning.

# The Ontario Secondary School Certificate (OSSC)

will be granted upon request to students who leave school before earning the Ontario Secondary Diploma, provided that they have earned a minimum of 14 credits.

#### **The Certificate of Accomplishment**

Students who are leaving secondary school upon reaching the age of 18 without having met the requirements for the Ontario Secondary School Diploma or the Ontario Secondary School Certificate may be granted a Certificate of Accomplishment.

The Certificate of Accomplishment may be a useful means of recognizing achievement for students who plan to take certain kinds of further training, or who plan to find employment directly after leaving school.

The Certificate of Accomplishment is to be accompanied by the student's Ontario Student Transcript.

## **Special Education**




